Certificate in African Studies



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The Certificate in African Studies provides students with valuable knowledge about Africa and the linguistic and cultural aspects of life on the continent. The program focuses on language, culture, and society and ensures that the students receiving the Certificate become culturally sensitive and aware of the diversity present on the continent. The Certificate is recommended to students wishing to gain international perspectives before entering the global marketplace.

It is not necessary to study abroad to earn the Certificate, but credit towards the Certificate can be earned by studying in Tanzania, Ghana, Kenya, or Morocco. Limited scholarship funds are available to cover the cost of traveling.

In order to earn the Certificate in African Studies, students must complete 16 credit hours with a grade of C or better from this list of courses endorsed by the African Studies Institute. These hours must be completed as 3 hours of credit for the compulsory course (AFST 2100: Introduction to Africa), 7 hours of course work in an African language (such as Arabic, Swahili, Yoruba, and Zulu), and 6 hours of elective course work among the listed content courses. The Certificate is awarded every spring during the Darl Snyder African Studies Lecture.

Application for the award of the Certificate and the review of course work is due on the last day of classes every FALL semester. Students with late applications will be reviewed and considered for the award in the following school year.
