### From the Director's Desk

And so it was, that the world shut down for nearly a year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In March 2020, when we were heading off for Spring break, there were already reports of a transmittable virus spreading widely around the world. Even then, it was nearly impossible to predict the subsequent pandemic and its damaging impacts on the World. The World literally came to a halt due to the Coronavirus and the restrictions to stop its spread. Instruction moved online and most activities of our institute were canceled or postponed. ASI is forever grateful to the faculty (Aderibigbe, Hovland, Maganda, Whitney, Ojo), graduate teaching assistants in both the institute and the African Language program (Akindipe, Sanu, Ajayi, and Kimario), staff (Jameelah Jones), and the Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistants (Shamsuddeen Bello, Bukunmi Ogunsola, and Madina Mahat) of the institute who successfully dealt with the health crisis and worked hard to ensure that we completed offering our full slate of courses. Even after the resumption for Fall 2020, the pandemic was still raging and once again, the ASI team successfully managed the crisis with no cut in the number of AFST classes offered and all institute programming holding as scheduled. Of course, all activities of the institute moved online including the Fall lecture which was delivered by Dr. Alexander Fyfe, a teaching fellow at the University of Edinburgh, England. Dr. Fyfe was scheduled to join our institute and the department of Comparative Literature and Intercultural Studies in Fall 2020 but his arrival was affected by the pandemic. He will be joining us in Fall 2021, which

incidentally will mark thirty-four years of African Studies programming on the University of Georgia campus.

As we look forward to this anniversary (and do our best to forget the pandemic-induced challenges of the thirty-third year), we send our best regards to all the core and affiliated faculty and staff members of the institute who have superbly supported the institute through these last two sessions. Service on committees has remained consistent, especially with the institute's curriculum committee. Thanks to this committee, the institute has been able to provide needed updates and reviews on our two academic programs undergoing review in the system. Even with online committee meetings and virtual core and affiliate faculty meetings (in Fall 2020), the business of the institute has proceeded excellently. We sincerely appreciate everyone affiliated with ASI. Notwithstanding the delays to the publication of the Africanist newsletter, we are devoting sections in this publication to recognize and acknowledge some of the awards, recognitions, and achievements of the affiliated faculty and staff. Our gratitude goes to the Franklin College for the administrative support, particularly Dr. Martin Kagel, the Franklin College Associate Dean charged with overseeing our institute. I will be ungrateful if I do not thank all the Deans, Directors, and Heads of colleges, departments, and other units on campus that have continued to support ASI. I am confident that we will continue to work harder together to raise the profile of our institute and provide increased learning opportunities about Africa for our students.

Spring 2021 has also been affected by the pandemic but the dedication and incredible resilience of the ASI team continues to amaze me, especially as we have continued to offer a full slate of AFST courses and programming. Our biweekly APERO Africana Brown bag lecture is back with a full slate of presentations along with the attached Africa Seminar course. Likewise, the Afrowood film series is back with the monthly screening of different African movies. These events continue to be held virtually and kudos to the program organizers, Bukunmi Ogunsola (for APERO) and Olumide Ajayi (for Afrowood).

With the support of affiliated students, faculty, staff, and administration, the institute was able to celebrate the academic achievements associated students and faculty with the successful hosting of the Annual Spring Lecture events on Tuesday, March 9, 2021. The events featured a Certificate in African Studies Recognition Ceremony and a virtual Annual Spring Lecture. At pm, seven undergraduate students (Ryan Kendall, Camron Sohn, Sydney Thompson, Hope Dockweiler, Ebony Upshaw, Lidya Ghedamu, and Anna Sewell) who had completed the requirements for the Certificate in African Studies (CAS) were recognized and virtually presented their Certificates. Faculty associated with the program were also recognized. The 2021 Spring Lecture took place at 3:30 pm. The virtual public lecture was delivered by UGA alumnus, Dr. Daniel A. Wubah, Ghana's Nana Ofosu Peko-Bekoe III, and President of Millersville University, Pennsylvania. The title of the lecture was "Rethinking Hierarchy: Perspective on Servant Leadership as a King and University President." It was quite exciting to see participants joining the webinar event from across the United States, Africa, and Europe. The Institute looks forward to a productive working relationship with Millersville University following Dr. Wubah's lecture.

The pandemic has drastically changed how we do our business but the African Studies Institute continues to adapt to all the changes including this delayed edition of the Africanist. Our two proposed academic programs (Major in African Studies and Graduate Certificate in African Studies) are undergoing curriculum reviews at various levels within the system. We continue to host the Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistants including two this year (Abu-Ubaida Sanni for Hausa and Elizabeth Mutunga for Swahili).

The University and our Institute have once again been awarded the Mandela Washington Fellowship (MWF) grant for 2021 from the U.S State Department. The program, which was suspended and partially moved online last summer is scheduled to hold virtually this summer. Our institute will be virtually hosting twenty-five Civic Engagement fellows from across Africa. Please look out for your invitation to join us in the virtual institute. More information on the program will be forthcoming. Finally, our congratulations to Dr. Dainess Maganda and the program in African Languages for the approval of the Minor in Swahili language and culture.







## **Apero Lectures & Afrowood Screening**


Like many of the events following March 2020, our TA's continued to host Apero Lectures and Afrowood movie screenings but did so via Zoom. Here are a few highlights:


